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What Next - No Guns ?



The mayor of Wellford, S.C. is defending a policy she issued earlier this month which bans police officers from chasing suspects on foot, according to WSPA-TV. On Sept. 2, Mayor Sallie Peake issued a memo to all of the city's officers that read: "As of this date, there are to be no more foot chases when a

suspect runs. I do not want anyone chasing after any suspects whatsoever." Peake told the news station that she issued the mandate because several officers have been injured during chases, driving up insurance costs for the town. The city is paying \$20,000 annually in workers' compensation claims, much of which goes to the police force, she said. According to Wellford Police Chief Chris Guy, three officers have been injured during foot chases in the last two years Guy has told his officers to abide by the policy and says they can still protect the public. "Just because a suspect may run does not mean we can't identify them, sign warrants, and

catch them later," he said. Spartanburg County Sheriff Chuck Wright disagrees with Guy's assessment, telling WSPA-TV that when a suspect gets away, there is always the chance he could hurt someone before officers catch up with him.

"If a bank robber or a drunk driver or a shoplifter or somebody with a warrant runs on foot, it's our obligation to do what we can do to bring them to justice," he said.

Phoenix police shot and killed a woman on Saturday after she tried to stab an officer in a barricade situation near 19th Avenue and Bethany Home Road, investigators said. Katherine Hysaw's neighbors, Mike Rocha and Celestina Berumen, said the 32-year-old woman was carrying a toilet seat lid when she showed up and complained there was

too much noise coming from their apartment. Berumen said Hysaw threw a toilet tank cover at their door, and then a couple of minutes later, came armed with a knife and bottle and started stabbing the door. "I'm scared," Rocha said. "I've got a newborn. What's going through my head is, 'Keep that door shut. Do everything you can to keep this crazy lady out.'" Rocha said he called 911 as the woman went back to her apartment. Officers tried to contact Hysaw by calling out to her through her door, but she refused to open it, saying she had a

knife, police said. She also said she was turning on the gas in the apartment, police said. Patrol officers called for a SWAT operation and notified the Phoenix Fire Department to turn off the gas to the building. When officers broke through the front door, Hysaw began throwing glass beer bottles at them, striking two officers, said Sgt. Andy Hill. A Taser was deployed, but missed the suspect, Hill said. As two other officers entered the apartment, Hysaw approached one officer and began striking him (Cont)

repeatedly in the upper chest region and neck with a butcher knife, Hill said. The blade was deflected by the officer's ballistic vest and neck protector, Hill said. Another officer, a 27-year-veteran, fired his rifle twice in defense of the officer being stabbed, Hill said. Hysaw was struck by the rounds and fell back into the bathroom, dropping the knife, Hill said. Paramedics responded and pronounced Hysaw dead. None of the officers was injured. Rocha said it's hard to believe all this happened over a noise complaint. "Somebody's life was taken today for nothing," Rocha said. The officer who

shot the woman has more than 20 years on the force, Hill said. Hill said the SWAT team did try a Taser first, but it wasn't effective. As for the officer stabbed, his vest was cut but he was not hurt. The officer who shot the woman is a veteran officer with more than 20 years on the police force. He is on routine paid leave while officers investigate whether the shooting was justified.

Cop Couple Dead In Murder Suicide



A woman's lifeless body lay on the cement. The man who had shot her was down, too, a self-inflicted gunshot to his head, his breathing too shallow to detect. "Someone's shooting in our parking lot ... please hurry, hurry, hurry!" a caller pleaded with a 911 dispatcher. "Come on, hurry!" The pleas were useless: Canton police said that 33-year-old Patricia Williams, a Detroit police officer, was already dead, and her killer and husband — Detroit homicide Detective Edward Williams, 36

had fatally turned the gun on himself. The Tuesday morning deaths were a marriage of two endemic problems plaguing police departments nationwide, experts said: domestic violence and suicides. "Police officers have unique jobs where they're instructed to keep their family life separate from their work life," said Eric Lambert, a professor with Wayne State University's department of criminal justice. "In reality, that's impossible. According to data compiled by WSU, Detroit officers face a higher suicide rate than most police, at 28 per 100,000 police officers, nearly twice as many as New York City Police. Also, marriages police officers are two to four times more likely to involve domestic violence. Canton police trying to piece together what led a Detroit

Police Department homicide investigator to shoot and kill his wife, then himself, face an uncomfortable reality: More police officers kill themselves in Detroit than in other big cities nationwide, and police in general have higher rates of domestic violence.

Four Charged In Attempted Murder After Officer Was Mistaken For Gang Rival

CHICAGO, IL – Four men were charged Sunday with allegedly trying to kill an off-duty Chicago police officer in a Southwest Side shooting that one police source said erupted when they mistook the gang-enforcement officer for a gang rival. The officer whom Chicago Police Department officials declined to identify was driving home about 3 a.m. Thursday through a section of Little Village carved up as turf by the Latin Kings and Two-Sixers, rival gangs that

have been fighting to dominate the local drug trade for decades. The officer, who was wearing a jersey-type shirt over his police uniform, sensed he was being followed by a car with four people inside, the source said. The men Fernando Lopez, 20, Jose Huerta, 21, Fernando Gonzalez, 19, and Jesus Rios, 20 are reputed members of the Latin Kings who were out to avenge an earlier shooting, the source said. A police spokesman Sun-

day would not confirm whether the shooting was gang-related. The officer tried to evade the men's car, driving several blocks until he finally pulled onto Pulaski Road at 26th Street, the source said. There, he made a quick U-turn in the street, and the car again followed right behind him as the officer headed toward the Police Department's Ogden District station on West Ogden Avenue, the Cook County state's attorney's office said during a



Bond Court hearing Sunday. At that point, the officer dialed 911 for help twice but the gang members allegedly accelerated and pulled up next to the officer on 26th Street.

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Officer Killed, Another Wounded, at Domestic Call



St PAUL, MN – Officer Richard Crittenden was about 90 minutes into his shift Monday morning when the call came for him to head to a familiar trouble spot. Just the day before, police had gone to the same unit at the Aspen Village apartments in North St. Paul for a domestic disturbance. Crittenden, not wanting to take any chances, called for and received backup from an officer in neighboring Maplewood. The pair arrived at the first-floor apartment at 2253 Skillman

Av. E. about 8:30 and confronted suspect Devon Dockery, a man authorities knew all too well. His latest run-in with the law would prove deadly. Within minutes of the officers' arrival there was a struggle, and then Crittenden was dead from a gunshot and his partner was wounded in the arm. Dockery also was dead. Hours later, as investigators were piecing together how the confrontation so quickly turned into gunfire, officers tearfully saluted as Crittenden's body was removed from the apartment to a waiting hearse. "Unfortunately, we respond to so many of [domestic disturbances], we may develop a certain nonchalance," Tom Lauth, the four-year North St. Paul police chief, told reporters at a late-afternoon news

conference on the City Hall steps. "This morning's incident typifies how quickly that can change". Crittenden, 57, is the first North St. Paul officer to die in the line of duty. He had been on the force for nine years; before that he was a deputy in Wabasha County. He was a husband, a father and a grandfather. The Maplewood officer wasn't identified by officials, but they said she was treated at Regions Hospital and released. "In my opinion, she assisted Officer Crittenden to the best of her ability and did what needed to be done," said Maplewood Police Chief David Thomalla. Dockery was suspected of violating a restraining order; a woman called police Monday morning to make the report.

Naked Gun: 91-year-old Nude Fla. Man Makes Arrest

LAKE WORTH, Fla. — Authorities say a 91-year-old South Florida man jumped out of bed naked and held an intruder at gunpoint until deputies arrived. The Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office said Robert E. Thompson woke up Saturday morning after a would-be burglar climbed his backyard fence and was met by his charging dog, Rettt, a

Rottweiler and Doberman pinscher mix. Thompson heard the commotion, grabbed his .38-caliber revolver and phoned police without ever getting dressed. Deputies say Thompson fired a warning shot as 26-year-old Jose Pasqual started to come toward him. Thompson kept his gun trained on Pasqual until deputies arrived. Pasqual



was booked in the Palm Beach County Jail on a burglary charge and did not immediately have an attorney.



Police Heroism - Officer Saves Baby from Burning Car

Routinely faced with life and death, some officers go above and beyond when it comes to protecting those in need. Read these stories of officers doing what it takes to save a life in desperate circumstances.

Quick action by a police officer may have saved a baby's life Thursday morning in Manassas. At around 5:45 a.m. on Yorkshire Lane, Officer Health Oyler, a seven-year veteran of the Prince William County Police department, was using his radar gun to catch potential speeders. Police say Oyler flagged down a car going 40 mph in a 25

mph zone. The car didn't stop. Oyler says he lost track of the car as it turned onto West Rugby Road. A few minutes later, the car had crashed into stone pillars on someone's front lawn in the 8500 block. With the car's engine on fire, Oyler says the driver tried to run — but fell down and then shouted, "my baby is in the car!" "I left where he was, and ran over and was able to find a door that was open and get the baby out of the car." The eight-month old girl, who was in a car seat, was taken out quickly with no injuries. The driver, Gustavo Adolfo Diaz-Bautista, 23, was seriously injured and is in the hospital



in stable condition. He has been charged with driving with a revoked license, eluding police and child abuse and neglect.

2 Men Try to Rob Off-duty Cop; 1 is Killed

Two robbers picked the wrong guy to hold up at gunpoint early yesterday in Cobbs Creek - an armed off-duty police officer. The 19th District cop shot and killed one of the men, said police spokesman Lt. Frank Vanore. The other ran away, firing at the officer as he fled, according to Vanore. The holdup

happened about 1:50 a.m. near 58th and Webster streets, as the officer, who had worked the late shift, was exiting his car, police said. One of the two men put a gun to the cop's chest and demanded money, Vanore said. Instead of pulling out his wallet, the officer pulled out his weapon and fired, striking

one of the men in his torso, police said. That suspect, whose identity had not been verified by police as of yesterday, was rushed to the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania, where he was pronounced dead.

Fake Cop Pulls Over La. Mayor

SHREVEPORT, La. — Police say a man impersonating an officer with a flashing red light in his car has been arrested after he pulled over the wrong driver — the mayor of Shreveport, La. Police think the suspect was using the in-dash light to maneuver through traffic Monday night in northwest Louisiana. Mayor Cedric Glover says he pulled over when the drove behind him, but the fake officer then sped away. Glover says he followed the car and called police. Daniel Niederheman,

21, of Shreveport has been charged with impersonation of a peace officer. Police seized the light and a handgun from Niederheman's holster. Authorities say Niederheman works for a private security company, but wasn't authorized to use the light

Disturbing Video Posted On Internet



“As sheriff, I want to personally apologize”

A disturbing video posted on the Internet forced disciplinary action against two Calumet County deputies. They're accused of making an effigy out of a sheriff's deputy's uniform and then burning it. "This was an unfortunate incident that has caused disgrace to our department, to the county, and to all of law enforcement," Sheriff Jerry Pagel said. The video was shot at a party six weeks ago in the Town of Harrison. The sheriff's department released new information Tuesday following an investigation. One deputy resigned and the other was demoted. The video grabbed the attention of the Calumet County Sheriff's Department

after it appeared on Facebook, a social networking web site. In the background you can hear racial slurs as badge numbers of various officers are placed on a uniform that's attached to a small cross and set on fire. "As sheriff, I want to personally apologize to anyone who finds these actions and comments offensive, and I was appalled and offended and I'm sure others will be as well," Sheriff Pagel said. Deputy Wendy Schultz was demoted as a result. She's been with the department almost 12 years. The other deputy, Jennifer Bass, resigned. She hosted the party, and had been with the department since 2005. "They wanted to

see how fast the uniform would burn and also as a stress reliever," Pagel said. The sheriff's department says the incident was reported by a Facebook friend of one of the deputies who thought the video was disturbing. The sheriff says the video first appeared online a couple weeks ago. He says it's an embarrassment but he hopes it won't reflect on the rest of the department and their professionalism. "I'll take the brunt of this. I'll be the one who answers those questions, and I'll be the one who tries to appease the public and try to make this right," Sheriff Pagel said.

38 Cases of Ammo Missing From Dallas Police



Dallas police are investigating the disappearance of 38 cases of ammunition from storage bunkers at the department's

Firearms Training Center in the Mountain Creek area. Officials believe the boxes of ammunition, worth about \$3,800, were taken in the last 30 days.

"The theft appears to have been committed by someone with release access to the facility," Lt. Andrew Harvey wrote in a news. The department's public integrity unit is investigating. According to a police report, officials conducted an inventory after staff members noticed on Monday that a security camera had been moved. an inventory found that 11 boxes of rifle ammunition

and 27 boxes of handgun ammunition had been taken. Police also have determined that a staff member was at the bunker when the camera was moved, the report said. "A complete inventory is being conducted of all the bunkers if any other loss exists," the report said. The pistol range is located at 3200 Mountain Creek Parkway.

Police Worry About Demise of Crown Vic

For police agencies, the Ford Crown Victoria has been like an old friend -- dependable, always there. So news that Ford Motor Co. plans to halt production of the sedan after 2011 worries local law enforcement leaders, who say they are worried about finding a suitable successor and about the potential costs of replacing equipment that has fit the "Crown Vic" year after year.

The Taurus may be Ford's next police vehicle, according to an Aug. 28 report in the Detroit News, though the automaker has not officially announced a successor to the Crown Victoria. Ford has told Police officials it plans to work closely with police agencies and aftermarket vehicle outfitters before 2011 to allow departments to purchase



whatever equipment they might need for the new patrol vehicles

Al Qaeda - Bombers Can Breach Even the Tightest Security



Al Qaeda has developed a new tactic that allows suicide bombers to breach even the tightest security, as CBS News correspondent Sheila MacVicar reports. Inside a Saudi palace, the scene was the bloody aftermath of an al Qaeda attack in August aimed at killing Prince Mohammed Bin Nayef, head of Saudi Arabia's counter terrorism operations. To get his bomb into this room, Abdullah Asieri, one of Saudi Arabia's most wanted men, avoided detection by two sets of airport security including metal detectors and palace security. He spent 30

hours in the close company of the prince's own secret service agents - all without anyone suspecting a thing. How did he do it? Taking a trick from the narcotics trade - which has long smuggled drugs in body cavities - Asieri had a pound of high explosives, plus a detonator inserted in his rectum. This was a meticulously planned operation with al Qaeda once again producing something new: this time, the Trojan bomber. The blast left the prince lightly wounded - a failure as an assassination, but as an exercise in defeating security, it was perfect. The bomber persuaded the prince he wanted to leave al Qaeda, setting a trap. Al Qaeda has an animated movie showing the meeting between the bomber and the prince. Asieri says more senior al Qaeda figures want to

surrender and convinces the prince to talk to them on a cell phone. In the conversation recorded by al Qaeda, you hear a beep in the middle of two identical phrases that are repeated by the bomber and his handler. Explosives experts tell CBS News that beep was likely a text message activating the bomb concealed inside Asieri. The Trojan bomber hands the phone to Prince Mohammed. He's standing next to him, and 14 seconds later, he detonates. "This is the nightmare scenario," said Chris Yates, an aviation security consultant. On a plane at altitude, the effects of such a bomb could be catastrophic. And there is no current security system that could stop it. "Absolutely nothing other than to require people to strip naked at the airport," said Yates. And al Qaeda says it will share its new technique via the Internet very soon. There is nothing that can stop that either.

'Cops' TV Crew, Officer Hurt in Oregon Crash

A Portland police patrol car carrying two crew members from the television show "Cops" collided with another car Tuesday night, police said. A Subaru Outback traveling in the opposite direction drifted into the lane of the patrol car and hit the officer's car head on, said Detective Mary Wheat of the Portland Police Bureau. The crash occurred at Southeast 136th Avenue and Stark Street at about 9 p.m. At least one of the cars involved rolled over onto its top.

Three people in the police car were injured and taken to local hospitals. They're all expected to survive, Wheat said. There were no serious injuries to the other driver. Wheat said the officer involved in the wreck was not responding to a report of a crime. A major crash team from the Portland Police Bureau has started investigating the crash. About nine blocks of Stark Street were shut down Tuesday night for the investigation. Ilesha Ash, who lives in

the area, witnessed the aftermath of the crash. "It's very bad. If you get on the other side, the cop car is all smashed up," Ash said. "And then the

car is all smashed up so it's pretty bad." "Cops" has been filming episodes in Portland for the past six weeks.

No.1 - Mara Salvatrucha (MS-13)

Territory: Central America, the United States

Right now, the street gang getting the most attention around the world is MS-13. The gang is a product of the Cold War, born of refugees from the 1980s Salvadoran Civil War who landed in Los Angeles. For a street gang, MS-13 operates with extreme organizational efficiency. In fact, they carry out investigations as well as hold local and regional meetings. The recent FBI crackdown on the group (which included the FBI's declaration that MS-13 is America's "most violent gang") will likely not scare them -- this is a gang who kidnapped and killed the son of a Honduran president. They have inspired legislation in Honduras and El Salvador that so harshly targets gang members that even human rights organizations

are crying foul. MS-13 makes all other gangs seem like foolish people selling drugs. MS-13 is in fact the deadliest gang that anyone will ever come into contact with. The gang mainly consists of Guatemalans, Hondurans, Salvadorans, and other Central Americans and was started in the 1980s to protect immigrants from other big gangs. The gang has been able to spread beyond Central America into Spain, U.S., Great Britain, Germany, and even Canada. MS-13 is well known for drug smuggling,

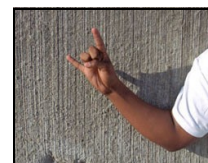


black market gun sales, theft, contract killing, human trafficking, and assault, especially on law enforcement. In the U.S. alone, the gang has 10,000 members. This gang has no remorse for killing anyone. Mara Salvatrucha is known for hunting down and killing anyone who speaks to law enforcement about the gang. MS-13 is known for its extremely violent crimes, especially against innocents. The gang has gone as far to set a bus full of children and women on fire which ended in 28 deaths.



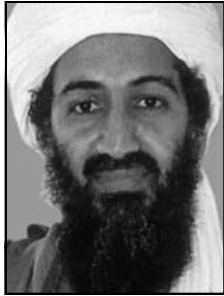
